What Child Is This The Child Who Is Zechariah's Hope First Sunday In Advent December 2, 2018

As We Gather

Zechariah's name means "God remembers." When God remembers someone, He acts on that person's behalf. But when God acted in the ultimate way, announcing the coming birth of the Messiah—and the coming birth of Zechariah's own child who would be the Messiah's forerunner—Zechariah doubted God's word. God temporarily caused him to be a priest without a voice. Yet, God still remembered His promises and sent His Son, the Christ Child, to be the perfect Priest. He offered Himself up on the cross as the perfect sacrifice, to obtain forgiveness and eternal life for mistrusting priests like Zechariah and you and me. What Child Is This? This child is Zechariah's only hope for salvation—and ours too. Thank you for worshipping at Peace Lutheran Church

People: according to Your steadfast love remember me, for the sake of

Confession And Forgiveness (Please remain standing)

Pastor: "Comfort, comfort my people," the Lord told Isaiah to speak to His

people. Let us confess our sins to God, confident that we shall hear His forgiving word of comfort for the sake of Christ, whose birth we are preparing to celebrate. - Silence for reflection on the Word of God and our sin.

- Gracious heavenly Father,

People: we confess that too often in our thinking we have relegated Your

promises to eternity. In our speaking, we have neglected to speak about the news of Your grace and mercy to the people around us. In our acting, we have considered our efforts as meriting Your attention. Though declared righteous by Your

grace with ancient Zechariah, we also share his doubts about Your readiness to bless us in our current circumstances. Forgive us and strengthen our faith in Him for whom Zechariah's son would prepare the way, Jesus, the Word made flesh, the babe, the Son of Mary.

Pastor:

The priest Zechariah was sentenced to silence because of his doubt, but the baby whose way his son, John, would prepare is both our great High Priest and also the Sacrifice for all our sins. Be still and hear His word of comfort and peace that I, His servant, proclaim to you: In the stead and by the command of my Lord Jesus Christ, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit.

People: Amen.

(We share the peace of the Lord with one another)

Hymn - What Child Is This (Stanza 2, LBW #40, please stand)

Why lies he in such mean estate where ox and ass are feeding? Good Christian, fear; for sinners here the silent Word is pleading. Nails, spear shall pierce him through, the cross be borne for me, for you; hail, hail the Word made flesh, the babe, the son of Mary!

First Reading - Isaiah 40:1–5 (Please be seated)

"Comfort my people," says our God. "Comfort them! ² Encourage the people of Jerusalem. Tell them they have suffered long enough and their sins are now forgiven. I have punished them in full for all their sins." ³ A voice cries out, "Prepare in the wilderness a road for the LORD! Clear the way in the desert for our God! ⁴ Fill every valley; level every mountain. The hills will become a plain, and the rough country will be made smooth. ⁵ Then the glory of the LORD will be revealed, and all people will see it. The LORD himself has promised this."

Second Reading – Romans 5:1-5 (Please remain seated)

Now that we have been put right with God through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. ² He has brought us by faith into this experience of God's grace, in which we now live. And so we boast of the hope we have of sharing God's glory! ³ We also boast of our troubles, because we know that trouble produces endurance, ⁴ endurance brings God's approval, and his approval creates hope. ⁵ This hope does not disappoint us, for God has poured out his love into our hearts by means of the Holy Spirit, who is God's gift to us.

Gospel Reading - Luke 1:5–25 (Please remain seated)

Though Zechariah expects the Messiah, the news from the angel seems too good to believe.

⁵ During the time when Herod was king of Judea, there was a priest named Zechariah, who belonged to the priestly order of Abijah. His wife's name was Elizabeth; she also belonged to a priestly family. ⁶ They both lived good lives in God's sight and obeyed fully all the Lord's laws and commands. ⁷ They had no children because Elizabeth could not have any, and she and Zechariah were both very old. 8 One day Zechariah was doing his work as a priest in the Temple, taking his turn in the daily service. 9 According to the custom followed by the priests, he was chosen by lot to burn incense on the altar. So he went into the Temple of the Lord, ¹⁰ while the crowd of people outside prayed during the hour when the incense was burned. 11 An angel of the Lord appeared to him, standing at the right side of the altar where the incense was burned. 12 When Zechariah saw him, he was alarmed and felt afraid. ¹³ But the angel said to him, "Don't be afraid, Zechariah! God has heard your prayer, and your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son. You are to name him John. 14 How glad and happy you will be, and how happy many others will be when he is born! ¹⁵ John will be great in the Lord's sight. He must not drink any wine or strong drink. From his very birth he will be filled with the Holy Spirit, 16 and he will bring back many of the people of Israel to the Lord their God. ¹⁷ He will go ahead of the Lord, strong and mighty like the prophet Elijah. He will bring fathers and children together again; he will turn disobedient people back to the way of thinking of the righteous; he will get the Lord's people ready for him." 18 Zechariah said to the angel, "How shall I know if this is so? I am an old man, and my wife is old also." 19 "I am Gabriel," the angel answered. "I stand in the presence of God, who sent me to speak to you and tell you this good news. 20 But you have not believed my message, which will come true at the right time. Because you have not believed, you will be unable to speak; you will remain silent until the day my promise to you comes true." ²¹ In the meantime the people were waiting for Zechariah and wondering why he was spending such a long time in the Temple. ²² When he came out, he could not speak to them, and so they knew that he had seen a vision in the Temple. Unable to say a word, he made signs to them with his hands. ²³ When his period of service in the Temple was over, Zechariah went back home. ²⁴ Some time later his wife Elizabeth became pregnant and did not leave the house for five months. ²⁵ "Now at last the Lord has helped me," she said. "He has taken away my public disgrace!"

Response (Please remain standing)

Pastor: Comfort, comfort My people, says your God. **People:** And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed.

Pastor: I will remember their sins and their lawless deeds no more.

People: And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed.

Pastor: He will make ready for the Lord a people prepared.

People: And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed.

Confession Of Faith - Apostles' Creed, Second Article (Please remain standing)

Pastor: What child is this, who, laid to rest, on Mary's lap is sleeping?

People: This, this is Christ the King, the Father's only Son, our Lord—

who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried. He descended into hell. The third day He rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of God the Father Almighty. From thence He will come to judge the

living and the dead—the Babe, the Son of Mary!

Commemorations

December 4 - John of Damascus, theologian and hymnwriter, died around 749: A monk in an abbey near Jerusalem, John wrote many hymns as well as theological works. One of his works, The Fount of Wisdom, remained influential for centuries.

December 6 - Nicholas, Bishop of Myra, died around 342:Little is known about Nicholas, except that he was a bishop in present-day Turkey. According to legend, he was famous for his giving to the poor, and so has become a symbol of anonymous gift-giving.

December 7 - Ambrose, Bishop of Milan, died 397: While a governor of northern Italy, Ambrose was elected bishop of Milan on the same day he was baptized. He was a famous preacher, a writer of hymns we still sing today, and helped lead St. Augustine to faith.

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
