We do not want to place any undue burden on anyone worshipping with us. Therefore, please feel free to sit whenever you desire. Thank you and Christ's blessings.

Restrooms – A restroom is located to the right just as you leave the sanctuary and enter the entrance hall. Restrooms for men and women are also located at the top of the stairs in the Parish Hall. Go into the lounge, turn right and continue up the stairs.

Fellowship and Refreshments – Immediately following worship, coffee and other refreshments and treats are served in Luther Lounge (the lounge just off the entrance hall). Come relax with us and enjoy the company as we will certainly enjoy your company.

Holy Communion — At Peace Lutheran we celebrate Holy Communion on the second and fourth Sunday of each month. Holy Communion is a very special meal for the children of God in Christ. All who have been baptized and believe in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior and all those who hunger and thirst for Christ's forgiveness and God's strength for living, are invited to join in Holy Communion. **Grape juice** (instead of wine) is available in the individual glasses in the middle of the tray. The wine is red; the grape juice is white. Pastor blesses any of the children who are brought to the communion rail. Any adults who come to the rail and desire a blessing but not communion may cross their arms and pastor will bless them.

Confession And Forgiveness (Hebrews 10:10, please remain standing)

Pastor: In the season of Advent we prepare for Jesus to come. Sometimes

in our preparations we lose sight of God's grace. Sometimes we are so desperate for God's approval we think we can earn His favor by doing more, by being better, or by scheming in just the right way. Despite God's unconditional love, we still try to earn our way into security and salvation. We turn to the Lord for forgiveness. - Silence for

reflection. - Heavenly Father,

People: we confess that we have not trusted Your Word of forgiveness,

life, and salvation. We have questioned if we are truly forgiven. We have doubted the new life we now live. We have distrusted Your way of salvation. Restore us, O God. Let Your face shine,

that we may be saved!

Pastor: God's ways are not our ways. Despite our continued failures and our

inability to trust as we ought, Christ's death and resurrection for our forgiveness remains effective, and it always will. Hear these words of forgiveness for they are from Christ Himself: As a called and ordained servant of Christ, and by His authority, I forgive you all your

sins in the name of the Father and of the

■ Son and of the Holy Spirit.

People: Amen. We have been sanctified through the offering of the body

of Jesus Christ once for all.

Hymn Of Praise - Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus

- 1 Come, thou long-expected Jesus, born to set thy people free; from our fears and sins release us; let us find our rest in thee. Israel's strength and consolation, hope of all the earth thou art, dear desire of ev'ry nation, joy of ev'ry longing heart.

First Reading - Micah 5:2-5a (Please remain seated)

The prophet Micah, having pronounced judgment upon Judah, speaks of a future shepherd-king who, like David, will come from the small town of Bethlehem. (Ephrathah refers to the area around Bethlehem.) This king will restore Israel and bring peace. New Testament writers understood this passage to be referring to Jesus.

² The LORD says, "Bethlehem Ephrathah, you are one of the smallest towns in Judah, but out of you I will bring a ruler for Israel, whose family line goes back to ancient times." ³ So the LORD will abandon his people to their enemies until the woman who is to give birth has her son. Then those Israelites who are in exile will be reunited with their own people. ⁴ When he comes, he will rule his people with the strength that comes from the LORD and with the majesty of the LORD God himself. His people will live in safety because people all over the earth will acknowledge his greatness, ⁵ and he will bring peace.

Second Reading - Hebrews 10:5-10 (Please remain seated)

The author of Hebrews uses the image of religious sacrifice to convey the significance of Christ's coming. Through obedient acceptance of God's will, Christ allows his own body to become the greatest sacrifice of all, one through which we are made a holy people.

⁵ For this reason, when Christ was about to come into the world, he said to God: "You do not want sacrifices and offerings, but you have prepared a body for me. ⁶ You are not pleased with animals burned whole on the altar or with sacrifices to take away sins. ⁷ Then I said, 'Here I am, to do your will, O God, just as it is written of me in the book of the Law.'" ⁸ First he said, "You neither want nor are you pleased with sacrifices and offerings or with animals burned on the altar and the sacrifices to take away sins." He said this even though all these sacrifices are offered according to the Law. ⁹ Then he said, "Here I am, O God, to do your will." So God does away with all the old sacrifices and puts the sacrifice of Christ in their place. ¹⁰ Because Jesus Christ did what God wanted him to do, we are all purified from sin by the offering that he made of his own body once and for all.

Gospel Acclamation (Luke 1:38, Please stand)

Pastor: Alleluia! "I am the Lord's servant," said Mary;

Gospel - Luke 1:46-55 (Please remain standing)

In Mary's song of praise we hear of a saving God who remembers, scatters, lifts up, and fulfills all things.

⁴⁶ Mary said, "My heart praises the Lord; ⁴⁷ my soul is glad because of God my Savior, ⁴⁸ for he has remembered me, his lowly servant! From now on all people will call me happy, ⁴⁹ because of the great things the Mighty God has done for me. His name is holy; ⁵⁰ from one generation to another he shows mercy to those who honor him. ⁵¹ He has stretched out his mighty arm and scattered the proud with all their plans. ⁵² He has brought down mighty kings from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly. ⁵³ He has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away with empty hands. ⁵⁴ He has kept the promise he made to our ancestors, and has come to the help of his servant Israel. ⁵⁵ He has remembered to show mercy to Abraham and to all his descendants forever!"

Response - O Little Town of Bethlehem (LBW #41, please be seated)

- O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie! Above thy deep and dreamless sleep the silent stars go by; yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting light. The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.
- 2 For Christ is born of Mary, and, gathered all above while mortals sleep, the angels keep their watch of wond'ring love.
 O morning stars, together proclaim the holy birth, and praises sing to God the king, and peace to all the earth!
- 3 How silently, how silently the wondrous gift is giv'n!
 So God imparts to human hearts the blessings of his heav'n.
 No ear may hear his coming; but, in this world of sin, where meek souls will receive him, still the dear Christ enters in.



Commemorations

December 26 - Stephen, Deacon and Martyr: Stephen was a deacon and the first martyr of the church. He was one of those seven upon whom the apostles laid hands after they had been chosen to serve widows and others in need. Later, Stephen's preaching angered the temple authorities, and they ordered him to be put to death by stoning.

December 27 - John, Apostle and Evangelist: The son of Zebedee and brother of James, John was one of the twelve disciples and witness to the transfiguration. Tradition has named him also the writer of the Gospel of John, the three New Testament letters bearing his name, as well as Revelation.

December 28 - The Holy Innocents, Martyrs: This day commemorates the young children killed by Herod in Bethlehem in his jealous attempt to murder the baby Jesus, a sobering reminder of the evil that led Christ to be born for our salvation.

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
