We Gather In The Presence Of God

Theme – "The Vineyard and the Stone" Matthew 21:33-46

The Pharisees were more concerned with the Law than with accepting Jesus as the Son of God. They had failed in their responsibilities to lead the nation of Israel both in their personal lives and public ones. So, Jesus told the Parable of the Tenants to illustrate that both Jews and Gentiles producing good fruit would occupy the Church and experience the unfolding of God's Kingdom through the Cornerstone- Jesus Christ.

We Are Renewed In God's Grace

Time of Confession and Forgiveness

Pastor: It's the rules that bind us to the Law. It's Love that frees us from the Law of

sin and death.

People Yet we are bound to the black and the white, the definitive answers,

the moral codes. We put boundaries on a boundless God. We put limits on the limitless Creator. We withhold forgiveness of others when our own sins have been cast out as far as the east is from the

west. Lord, we confess.

Pastor: What would it look like to live a life led by Jesus? To follow His pure example

and to seek Him for everything? What would it be like to forgive as we've been forgiven, to offer grace in place of judgment, and to speak truth and see the Spirit of God transform lives? What would it look like to follow Jesus wholeheartedly, even when our minds can't make sense of the answers?

Lord, we need You to fill us with Your Spirit.

People: We ask for Your forgiveness, Jesus. You freely gave Your life for us

on the cross. Your blood was shed to cover a multitude of trespasses,

and Your body was bruised, beaten, and abused on our behalf.

Pastor: May we learn the lesson of forgiveness and live out a lifestyle of truth and

grace, just as Jesus, the Cornerstone, did for us.

People By Your grace alone, may we live according to Your Word. In Jesus'

name we ask these things, Amen.

God Speaks Through His Word

First Reading - Isaiah 5:1-7

The prophet sings a sad, parable-like love song about the relationship between God and Israel. In this song Israel is compared to a promising vineyard. Despite God's loving care, the vineyard that is Israel has brought forth "wild grapes" of injustice and distress, when fine grapes of justice and righteousness were expected.

Pastor:

¹Let me sing for my beloved my love-song concerning his vineyard: My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill. ²He dug it and cleared it of stones, and planted it with choice vines; he built a watchtower in the midst of it, and hewed out a wine vat in it; he expected it to yield grapes, but it yielded wild grapes. ³And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and people of Judah, judge between me and my vineyard. ⁴What more was there to do for my vineyard that I have not done in it? When I expected it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes? ⁵And now I will tell you what I will do to my vineyard. I will remove its hedge, and it shall be devoured; I will break down its wall, and it shall be trampled down. ⁶I will make it a waste; it shall not be pruned or hoed, and it shall be overgrown with briers and thorns; I will also command the clouds that they rain no rain upon it. ⁷For the vineyard of the LORD of hosts is the house of Israel, and the people of Judah are his pleasant planting; he expected justice, but saw bloodshed; righteousness, but heard a cry! ... This is God's Word

People: Thanks be to God.

Gospel Reading - Matthew 21:33-46

Jesus tells a parable to the religious leaders who are plotting his death, revealing that their plans will, ironically, bring about the fulfillment of scripture.

Pastor:

[Jesus said to the people:] 33"Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watchtower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country. 34When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. ³⁵But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. ³⁶Again he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way. ³⁷Finally he sent his son to them, saying, 'They will respect my son.' 38But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, 'This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance.' ³⁹So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. 40 Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?" 41They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time." ⁴²Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the scriptures: 'The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is amazing in our eyes'? ⁴³Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and

given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. ⁴⁴The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls." ⁴⁵When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them. ⁴⁶They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet. ... This is the Gospel of our Lord.



Commemorations

October 4 - Francis of Assisi, renewer of the church, died 1226: Born into the family of a wealthy merchant, Francis gave up his inheritance to serve poor people. He formed the Order of Friars Minor (called Franciscans), who took on poverty and the task of preaching "using words if necessary." Francis had a spirit of gratitude for all of God's creation.

October 6 - William Tyndale, translator, martyr, died 1536: Tyndale was ordained a priest in England, and wished to translate the Bible into English. He was opposed in this by King Henry VIII, causing him to flee to Germany. He completed the New Testament in 1525, but before he could finish the Old Testament, he was tried for heresy and burned at the stake.

October 7 - Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, pastor in North America, died 1787: Divided Lutherans in America asked leaders in Europe to send someone who could take charge and unite their work. Muhlenberg was sent, and was effective in organizing the American Lutherans. Among other accomplishments, his liturgical principles became the basis for the Common Service of 1888.

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
